MEDITERRANEAN CLIMATE

- characterized by mild winters and warm summers
- hottest months are July and August w/ avg. high temps of 28°C (82°F)
- winter months (December-February) are mild w/ avg. temps ranging from 9-16°C (48-61°F)
- rainfall is moderate throughout the year w/ the wettest months being November to January
- relatively low humidity w/ avg. levels ranging from 60-70% (more humid inside homes)
- a refreshing sea breeze helps to moderate the hot summer temps

- Cascais offers a range of options, including public, private, and international schools
- international schools are popular among expat families, and offer curricula such as the International Baccalaureate (IB) and Cambridge International Examinations
- curricula in public schools is taught in Portuguese, while private and international schools often offer bilingual or multilingual education
- families commute from all over to attend the popular schools of Cascais
- Popular schools in the area: CAISL, OIS, ISS, Os Aprendizes, St. James, St. Dominic's, St. Julian's, TASIS, IPS, King's College

PUBLIC, PRIVATE, AND MORE

- Cascais has two main hospitals, one public and one private
- Cascais Hospital is part of the universal healthcare system (SNS) and offers 24-hr emergency services
- CUF Cascais is part of the CUF private healthcare network of providers
- Both have modern facilities and multilingual doctors, nurses, and staff
- CUF is popular due to its central location and acceptance of most private health insurances
- pharmacies are abundant all over town and some even have drive-through services

- most popular is the train, which gets you to Lisbon Cais do Sodre Station in 40 minutes
- the train station is centrally located in the historic center, from which you can reach many attractions and amenities on foot
- there is also a good bus network, offering connections throughout Cascais as well as to nearby destinations
- taxis, Uber, and Bolt are also provide a convenient and affordable way to get around, most rides around town costing less than 5€

Beneficial Tax Structure for Investors

PORTUGAL OFFERS SEVERAL TAX ADVANTAGES FOR INVESTORS, BOTH DOMESTIC AND FOREIGN.

- relatively low corporate tax rate of 21% for SMBs
- favorable tax environment for real estate investment, with a reduced tax rate of 28% on long-term rental income and as low as 6% on short-term rental income
- several tax credits and incentives for businesses, including research and development tax credits and tax incentives for renewable energy projects
- no wealth tax or inheritance tax, making it an attractive location for those with significant assets or inheritance

- easy to integrate with the expat community


Cons

 culture and lifestyle in Cascais compared to other regions
- more difficult to integrate with the native community
